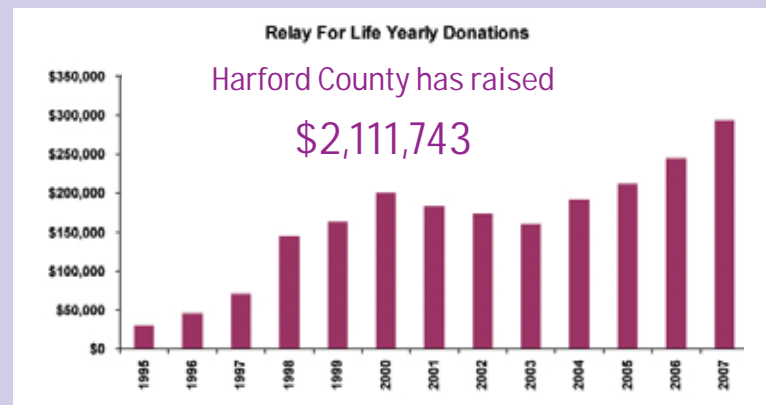
Harford County Fights Back!

Relay For Life[®], the American Cancer Society's signature event, has been a growing force in Harford County since 1995. It is a fun-filled overnight experience where those who have been touched by cancer gather to celebrate survivors, remember those lost to cancer, and to fight back against this disease.

During Relay For Life[®] events, teams of people gather at local schools and take turns walking laps. The events are held overnight to represent the fact that cancer never sleeps. Through the Survivors' Lap we honor the people who have faced cancer first hand, and through the Luminaria Ceremony we remember those who have been lost to this disease.

Relay is a place where people connect with others, share the cancer experience, and find comfort and solace. And it's an opportunity to build hope for a future where cancer no longer threatens the lives of the people we love.

From its humble beginning with 14 teams at Bel Air High School where \$30,000 was raised, to this year's 3 events with over 100 teams and a goal of \$312,000, the Relay For Life empowers people to fight back against cancer.

KELLY'S STORY

NO ONE SHOULD HAVE TO GO THROUGH CANCER ALONE

At age 22, I was diagnosed with a rare type of brain cancer called Medulloblastoma. After about two months of symptoms (extreme dizziness, pain in the back of my head and nausea), the tumor was discovered on an MRI. I had a 7 ½ hour surgery to remove a tumor that was the size of an orange. I was told after surgery that there was a less than 5% chance the tumor would be malignant.

I was in ICU for two weeks after surgery with a tube coming out of my head draining spinal fluid off of my brain. About two weeks after my hospital release, I began 34 rounds of a high dosage of radiation therapy. I would lie face down in what I call a "torture chamber" with a mask clamped onto the back of my head to have the radiation treatment to my brain and spine. This lasted for about two minutes and made me very ill.

I am very lucky to have a fantastic husband, a supportive family and a strong faith, which helped me through all of this; however, I felt very alone during treatment. Being 22 and going through cancer I didn't feel like I fit in. I wasn't a child, but I wasn't in the over 40 crowd either. No one spoke to me in the dressing area while I was waiting to receive my radiation treatment.

Because of my experience I decided to join the American Cancer Society Relay for Life as a volunteer. No one should have to go through cancer alone, isolated and confused. My goal is to make the public aware that cancer can occur at any age and to be a friend and supporter to other young cancer survivors.

JUDY'S STORY

RESEARCH LEADS TO RECOVERY

Eleven years ago, I was diagnosed with breast cancer. I had just helped my daughter get through her own experience of discovering a lump in her breast. We were relieved when the doctor diagnosed the lump as a cyst that could be removed. Two months later, I was visiting the same doctor who gave me my diagnosis of breast cancer.

After surgery, chemotherapy & radiation, my recovery and remission was in part thanks to five years of taking Tamoxifen, the drug created by ACS-funded researchers. Because of the millions of dollars raised over the last twenty-three years through Relay For Life, the ACS was able to support the research that led to my recovery. I am grateful that such a wonderful discovery was made in even a small part, by the fundraising efforts of communities in Maryland.

In 2001, I became a Reach to Recovery volunteer so that I could help other women facing breast cancer. Volunteering for the American Cancer Society has been a great opportunity to reassure and help women understand that they don't have to be a silent patient—that there are so many of us here to talk and listen to them live through their experience with cancer.

I feel so blessed and thankful for all my family and friends that supported me through my cancer diagnosis and treatments. I have so much to live for—my husband, my two daughters, and my four grandchildren who bring joy to my life every day... And so I Relay to raise funds to find a cure for cancer.
